## **Prayer of the Blessing of Manasseh**

"Joseph called the name of the firstborn Manasseh: 'For God has made me forget all my toil and all my father's house." — Genesis 41:51

Father, in the name of Jesus, I come before You, God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, to receive the blessing spoken over the tribe of Manasseh. Through Christ, I am grafted into the covenant promises of Israel (Romans 11:17–24), and all Your promises are "Yes and Amen" in Him (2 Corinthians 1:20).

Lord, You appointed Manasseh as a tribe of healing, restoration, and expansion. His very name declares that You can cause the pain of the past to lose its grip because of the goodness You pour into the future. I receive this blessing. Let Your presence reach into the deep places of my heart and release me from every sorrow, memory, or burden that has tried to shape my identity. Let Your abundance speak louder than my history.

When Jacob blessed Ephraim and Manasseh, he declared that Manasseh would become a great people (Genesis 48:19). Let this greatness be reflected in my life—not worldly status, but spiritual maturity, resilience, and strength. Make me one who rises in confidence, walks in wholeness, and carries Your authority with humility.

Tradition teaches that Manasseh served closely beside Joseph in administration, stewardship, and governance. Grant me that same steady responsibility. Give me a heart capable of wise leadership, faithful service, and the courage to step into roles that require strength and clarity.

Your Word reveals that Manasseh inherited territory on both sides of the Jordan River (Joshua 17), marking them as a people who expand boundaries, occupy new spaces, and cross barriers others fear to cross. Let this anointing come upon me. Empower me to step into assignments that stretch my faith, enter territory that You have appointed, and break through limitations that once held me back. Make me bold like the daughters of Zelophehad, descendants of Manasseh, who asked for and received their inheritance (Numbers 27:1–7). Give me the courage to claim what You have promised.

There is also a blessing of renewal and identity restoration in Manasseh. Lord, realign my heart where identity has been fractured. Heal places in me where



generational patterns tried to dictate my story. Let Your Spirit uproot old cycles so I can walk in the newness You have prepared.

Strengthen me to break out of constriction. Let me be one who moves with Your timing, recognizes when You are opening new seasons, and embraces change when You call for it. Teach me when to advance, when to occupy, and when to rest.

Search me, O God, and know my heart (Psalm 139:23–24). Reveal any place where I have held on to pain, disappointment, or fear from the past. Forgive me for letting old wounds define me, for resisting Your healing, or for shrinking back from expansion. I repent of small thinking, hesitation, passivity, or fear of stepping into new territory. Cleanse me from bitterness, comparison, resentment, or unforgiveness toward family—anything that would block the blessing of Manasseh from flowing freely in my life. Teach me to release the past—not by ignoring it, but by letting Your grace transform it. Turn every wound into wisdom, every setback into strength, and every limitation into opportunity for Your glory.

Bind my heart to Your promises, Lord. Let the healing, expansion, and restoration of Manasseh rest upon me.

Let me walk in the greatness spoken by Jacob, the blessing spoken by Moses, and the fullness secured for me in Christ.

## I receive Manasseh's inheritance:

- healing that frees the heart
- release from past sorrow
- boldness to advance
- courage to claim new territory

- restoration of identity
- strength to lead and steward well
- and expansion according to Your will

May my household walk in this same blessing—whole, healed, fruitful, and established in Your love and purpose. Blessed are You, Lord God of Israel, who restores what was lost, who breaks old cycles, and who enlarges the borders of those who trust You.
